This month is my favorite for so many reasons: holiday music, spending time with family, decorating, etc. When my kids ask me what I would like for Christmas, I simply say, "World Peace, so that you may have a great and safe country to live in." Considering the season, I searched the web for a story about peace. I hope

you enjoy the following:

"Tragedy struck the home of America's most popular poet. On July 9, 1861, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's wife, Fanny, was near an open window sealing locks of her daughter's hair in a packet, using hot sealing wax. It was never known whether a spark from a match or the sealing wax was the cause, but suddenly her dress caught fire and engulfed her with flames. Her husband, sleeping in the next room, was awakened by her screams. He desperately tried to put out the fire and save his wife. He was severely burned on his face and hands. She, tragically burned, slipped into a coma the next day and died. His grievous burns would not even allow him to attend her funeral. He seemed to lock the anguish within his soul. Because he continued to work at his craft, only his family knew of his personal suffering. They could see it in his eyes and observe his long periods of silence. His white beard, so identified with him, was one of the results of the tragedy - the burn scars on his face made shaving almost impossible.

"Although a legend in his own time, he still needed the peace that God gives to His children. On Christmas Day, three years following the horrible accident - at age 57 - he sat down to try to capture, if possible, the joys of the season. He began:

"I heard the bells on Christmas day. Their old familiar carols play, And wild and sweet the words repeat Of peace on earth, good will to men." "As he came to the third stanza he was stopped by the thought of the condition of his beloved country. The Civil War was in full swing. The Battle of Gettysburg was not long past. Days looked dark, and he probably asked himself the question, "How can I write about 'peace on earth, good will to men' in this war-torn country, where brother fights against brother and father against son?" But he kept writing - and what did he write?

"And in despair I bowed my head:
'There is no peace on earth,' I said,
'For hate is strong, and mocks the song
Of peace on earth, good will to men!"

"And so we have the marvelous Christmas carol "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." A musician named John Baptiste Calkin wrote the musical setting that has helped make the carol a favorite. Just as that Christmas in 1864 was made better for Longfellow, may we experience a Christmas that will be the greatest ever. May we actually find the peace that Longfellow wrote about in the carol" ~ Author Unknown

Holiday Recipe

Cranberry Nut Bread

- 2 c. flour
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 TBSP baking powder
- ½ tsp salt
- 2 tsp orange zest
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 c. orange juice
- ¼ c. cooking oil
- 1 c. coarsely chopped cranberries
- ¾ c. chopped nuts (I use pecans)

This recipe is for small loaf pans ($4\frac{1}{2}$ x $2\frac{1}{2}$ x $1\frac{1}{2}$). Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease the bottom and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch up the sides of the pans. In a large bowl stir together flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt.

In a separate bowl combine the egg, orange juice, and oil. Add egg mixture all at once to flour mixture. Stir just until moistened. Fold in nuts and cranberries. Spoon batter into prepared pans.

Bake for 30 to 35 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes before removing from pans. Cool completely, then wrap and store overnight before slicing.

Tips & Tricks

Google is the most widely used search engine and the single most visited page on the Internet. "Google it" is a common term we use whenever we need any information. Now it is a verb synonymous with looking up information online. Google has changed the way we browse information and connect to the world. An article posted on TechWorm.com in January 2016, lists 25 tips and tricks to improve your browsing. Here are a few that may be helpful to you in your job.

Use quotes to search for an exact phrase or explicit search

This one's a well-known, simple trick: searching a phrase in quotes will yield only pages with the same words in the same order as what's in the quotes. It's one of the most vital search tips, especially useful if you're trying to find results containing a specific a phrase.

Use an asterisk within quotes to specify unknown or variable words

Here's a lesser known trick: searching a phrase in quotes with an asterisk replacing a word will search all variations of that phrase. It's helpful if you're trying to determine a song from its lyrics, but you couldn't make out the entire phrase (e.g. "imagine all the * living for today"), or if you're trying to find all forms of an expression (e.g. "* is thicker than water").

Exclude Words by using minus sign.

Let's say you want to search for content about techworm, but you want to exclude any results that contain the term *malware*. To do this, simply use the – sign in front of the word you want to exclude.

• Search for a particular meaning

Add a hyphen in front of a word to avoid a particular search term. This comes handy when you search something and it has several meanings. Ex. Riddick –cartoon.

Search websites for keywords or searching inside a website

Think of the "site:" function as a Google search that searches only a particular website. If you want to see every time Techworm.net mentioned Google, use the search "Google site:techworm.net". You can use the similar technique in Google News also.

Search news archives going back to the mid-1880s. Google News has an option to search over 100 years' worth

Google News has an option to search over 100 years' wor of archived news from newspapers around the world.

This OR That

By default, when you conduct a search, Google will include all the terms specified in the search. If you're looking for any one of one or more terms to match, then you can use the OR operator. (Note: The OR has to be capitalized).

• Use "DEFINE:" to learn the meaning of words—slang and current Internet acronyms included

Streamline the dictionary process by using, for example, "DEFINE: mortgage." For words that appear in the dictionary, you'll be able to see etymology and a graph of its use over time alongside the definition. Google will even sift the web to define slang words or acronyms. Try out "DEFINE: bae" or "DEFINE: SMH".

Search images using images.


Ever come across a photo that looks strangely familiar? Or, do you want to know where it came from? If you save the image, and then search it on Google Images (with the camera button), you'll be able to see similar images on the web.

• Translate with Google

Type "translate language1 to language2" to get the Google translator working instantly for you. Ex: "translate English to French How are you?"

Weather Search

To take a look at the weather predictions for your city, just add "weather" before the city's name or zipcode. Ex: "weather New Jersey."
