Psychologists define attitudes as a learned tendency to evaluate things in a certain way and that there are several different components that make up attitudes.

An Emotional Component: How the object, person, issue makes you feel.

A Cognitive Component: Your thoughts and beliefs about the subject.

A Behavioral Component: *How the attitude influences your behavior.*

Attitudes form as a result of experience. They may emerge due to direct personal experience, or they may result from observation. Researchers have discovered that people are more likely to behave according to their attitudes under certain conditions:

- \Rightarrow When your attitudes are the result of personal experience.
- $\Rightarrow\,$ When you are an expert in the subject.
- \Rightarrow When you expect a favorable outcome.
- \Rightarrow When the attitudes are repeatedly expressed.
- \Rightarrow When you stand to win or lose something due to the issue.

While attitudes can affect behavior, they are not set in stone. Learning to change attitudes can happen after observing the behavior of others, by being influenced by others or when a conflicting belief about a topic takes place. In short we can control our attitude and make changes when it affects our well-being.

According to Winston Churchill, "Attitude is a little thing that makes a big difference."



Recipe Corner

What is Valentine's Day without a good sugar cookie? I know that everybody has their own preferences where sugar cookies are concerned, but, through MUCH trial and error, I've found that this cookie, as well as frosting recipe works for me and my family. (And – in a pinch, *The Art Garden* sells a pretty good alternative!)

Favorite Sugar Cookies

1 c. butter 1 c. powdered sugar 1 egg, beaten 1 ½ tsp. almond extract 1 tsp. vanilla 1 tsp. salt 2 ½ c. flour

Cream butter, then add powdered sugar. Blend in egg, almond extract, vanilla, salt and flour. Chill dough until firm. Roll to ¼ inch thickness on well-floured surface. Cut with cookie cutters and place on lightly greased cookie sheets. Bake at 375 degrees for 8 – 10 minutes. Cookies should not brown. Frost and decorate when cool.

Makes approximately 2 dozen, depending on the size of the cutters.

Whipped Cream Cheese Frosting

1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened 1 ½ c. powdered sugar 1/8 tsp. salt ½ tsp. vanilla extract 1 ½ c. heavy whipping cream

Combine the cream cheese, sugar, salt and vanilla in a large bowl mix on medium speed until very smooth. In a separate bowl, beat the cream to stiff peaks. Add the whipped cream to the cream cheese mixture. Mix until well combined and smooth. Put portions of the frosting in separate bowls to add desired color(s). Can store in the refrigerator for up to one week. Welcome Aboard


