Title I

Recipe

French Dip Sliders

1 lb. deli roast beef
1 pkg Au Jus Seasoning Mix
1½ c. French fried onions
¾ tsp dried minced garlic
½ tsp onion powder
seasoned salt (to taste)
1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
1 pkg Hawaiian Sweet Rolls



10 Tbsp butter, unsalted 12 slices Provolone cheese sesame seeds, toasted (to taste)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter the bottom of 9 X 13 baking dish with the softened, unsalted butter.

Without separating the rolls, slice the entire package of rolls in half. Place the bottom half of the rolls in the baking dish. Layer half the cheese, roast beef, onions, remaining cheese, and the top half of the rolls.

In a small bowl, melt butter in the microwave. Mix in 1 Tbsp of Au Jus Seasoning Mix, Worcestershire sauce, sesame seeds, dried minced garlic, onion powder and seasoned salt. Whisk until well combined. Top the rolls evenly with this mixture (you probably won't need it all – but that is ok because it saves well and is good on steaks, bread, etc.) Bake the sliders uncovered until the cheese is gooey and the tops of the rolls are golden brown, about 15-20 minutes. Remove and cut sliders with a sharp knife.

While the sliders are baking, take the remaining au jus mixture and place in a small saucepan over medium heat. Add 2 cups cold water and whisk. Bring to a boil and reduce the heat to a simmer to allow it to thicken slightly. Serve au jus with sandwiches.

National Children's Dental Health Month



Keynote Presentation

"Bully Free Starts with Me"

~Presented by USEA

Bullying behavior is a growing concern among America's educators. Bullying is generally defined as repeated aggressive acts intended to do harm, and is characterized by a power or status difference between the students. Bullying includes not only physical aggression such as hitting or stealing, but also verbal aggression, such as threatening, name calling, spreading rumors, socially rejecting and isolating someone, or cyberbullying.

Students who have been bullied report feeling depressed, anxious, and isolated. Many have low self-esteem. Their school attendance and performance may suffer. In some cases, they are so tormented they can take their own lives.

Bullying seldom happens in the school office, but the fallout from it makes the school office the front line of prevention and intervention. Clerical services ESPs (secretaries, administrative aides, office assistants, accountants, receptionists, etc.) are frequently in the position to hear reports of bullying from students and parents. With a shortage of counselors in many schools, clerical services professionals often become the informal counselor to the bully, the target, and their parents at a highly emotional time.

NEA's Bully Free Campaign identifies caring adults in schools and communities who are willing to stand up as someone pledged to help bullied students. These caring adults agree to listen carefully to the bullied student who comes to them. They also agree to take action to stop the bullying. NEA, in turn, provides those caring adults with the on-line resources they need to provide solace and support for the bullied student, and to take the appropriate actions needed to stop the bullying.

"Push to Survive"

~ presented by Unified Fire Authority

Push to Survive is a public safety announcement and public education campaign brought to you by Unified Fire Authority and Salt Lake City Fire Department. Each minute a non-beating heart goes without proper chest compressions, their chance of survival is diminished by 10%. Average response times in Salt Lake County, regardless of what city, township, or region you live, is 5-8 minutes from when you call 9-1-1. These organizations have worked tirelessly with several public safety entities to improve the outcome of victims of Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest (OHCA). Currently nearly 300,000 people experience OHCA each year. Nationally, 92% of these people do not survive. If hands-only CPR is started by a bystander within 2 minutes, and EMS arrives and administers High Performance Resuscitation Standards, 1 in 2 of these victims can survive and return to a normal life.
