Potluck Party Recipe Submitted by Marilee Evans, Membership Chair

Buckeyes

Total Time: Prep: 30 Min. +chilling Makes approximately 5 ½ dozen

Ingredients

- 5 ¹/₂ cups confectioners' sugar
- 1²/₃ cups peanut butter
- 1 cup butter, melted
- 4 cups semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon shortening (or coconut oil)

Directions

1. In a large bowl, beat the sugar, peanut butter and butter until smooth. Shape into 1-in. balls; set aside.

2. Microwave chocolate chips and shortening (I used coconut oil) on high until melted; stir until smooth. Dip balls in chocolate, allowing excess to drip off. Place on a wire rack over waxed paper; refrigerate for 15 minutes or until firm. Cover and store in the refrigerator.

I found this recipe while looking for something yummy to take to an office party. I love that it is simple and no bake, perfect for hot August! I didn't think I needed 5 ½ dozen, but they were devoured so fast I didn't get to take any home.



What is GCPS/PSP? Submitted by Juliane Hamblin, PSP Chair

Would you like to earn an extra \$600.00 to \$905.00? We have a program for you! Granite Certified Professional Standards program (GCPS) is designed to encourage professional growth through education. Secretaries who obtain a professional certificate through GCPS or through the national Professional Standards Program (PSP) will be paid an extra amount each year in recognition of their achievement in obtaining the certificate. You can achieve any of the levels of GCPS/PSP through education or job enhancement training. Payment for certificates for contract secretaries will be added into your annual salary, and divided among the 24 paychecks. Payments for GCPS certificates for noncontract secretaries (who work at least 20 hours per week) will be made once a year in April. The dollar amount will be prorated based on the number of hours worked. Rules and procedures for obtaining a GCPS certificate are established by Granite School District and can be found at gaeop.weebly.com. PSP requirements are set by the National Association for Educational Office Professionals and can be found at naeop.org.




