November Epilepsy Awareness

November is National Epilepsy Awareness month. Epilepsy, commonly known as 'seizures', affects millions of Americans each year. Treatment for Epilepsy can help to manage the condition; however, no cure has been found. Epilepsy is a brain



disorder that causes reoccurring seizures. There is no identifiable cause. Epilepsy can last for several years or be lifelong. Family history can also play a part.

If you encounter someone having a seizure, you should take precautions. Stay calm. Do not leave. Stay with the person until the seizure ends and you know they are fully awake. Place something soft under the head and try to gently roll the patient to their side. Loosen any restrictive clothing, especially around the neck. Do not try to hold the person down. Allow the process to occur naturally. If you are able, time the seizure and dial 911 if a person is down longer than 5 minutes and/or injury occurs. Speak softly and once they wake, let them know in clear terms what happened without excitement. After the occurrence, do not let the person drive and call a taxi if necessary. Fun and unusual Facts about Thanksgiving

- President Franklin D. Roosevelt officially changed the date of Thanksgiving in 1941 to be the fourth Thursday of the month to encourage more holiday shopping to boost the economy. This was not a popular decision, and he was compared to Hitler.
- "Jingle Bells" was originally written for Thanksgiving. James Lord Pierpont wrote the song called "One Horse Open Sleigh" for his father's Sunday school to be performed on Thanksgiving. It was not inspired by Santa and his famous sleigh pulled by magic reindeer.
- Thanksgiving leftovers led to the first ever TV dinner.
- Female Turkeys don't gobble. Only male turkeys make the famous "gobble, gobble" sound. The female makes other sounds, such as purring and cackling.


