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# **GAEOP President's Message**



Discussing coping strategies for dealing with change seems timely for our district. We have our new FOCUS student information system, a new phone system, new programs for safe walking routes and for injury

reporting, a fairly new format for print shop orders, and new ways of requesting technology help and retrieving training material (HALO). With the beginning of a new school year, many of you may also be dealing with new administrators, new co-workers, or maybe even new work locations or other procedural or environmental changes.

Julie Perine, from All Things Admin, makes some great points that I would like to share. I have combined parts of her articles along with some of my thoughts. Find her original articles here. "Sometimes we can plan for change. Sometimes it is thrust upon us or happens without warning. Change is inevitable. And as much as we may resist it, without it we'd still be using rotary phones and manual typewriters. Change gets a bad rap, yet it can be a very positive thing. To survive in business today, every member of the team, especially administrative professionals, must identify, understand, and respond to change. But to thrive, you have to become a champion of change!

How you react determines whether you'll sink or swim. The ability to adapt isn't something most people are born with; it is something to be learned. And it all starts by embracing the Innovation Mindset, also referred to as the Growth Mindset.

What can help us deal with change?

- Seeing challenges as opportunities to learn and improve rather than obstacles to go around.
- Striving to understand the purpose or reason for the change.
- Looking for value in the new situation and objectively examining the pros and cons.
- Prioritizing problem-solving skills.

- Remembering that many of the beauties of nature come through change - such as changing seasons, life cycles, plant or tree growth, and caterpillars turning to butterflies.
- Having a positive attitude toward change makes it easier to adapt to new situations."

Not all changes are good, but likewise, not all changes are bad. Here are some positives I've noticed while reflecting on a couple of recent changes. Secretaries coming to the aid of others when asked how to print a class list, or drop a student, or how to find information. Some are sharing what they have learned. The I.S. Facilitators are addressing FOCUS issues as rapidly and thoroughly as possible. Now that we are asked to use HALO to submit work requests, it may take longer to type in the requested information than to ask over the telephone, but it is also a more efficient way for problems to be tracked, routed correctly, and then resolved. And it is building a reservoir of reference material for future 1156

Change can be hard as it pushes us out of our comfort zone and requires adjustments to our thinking. However, I am extremely grateful that we are not still using rotary telephones and manual typewriters. I look forward to future advancements. Julie reminds us that "change is inevitable; growth is optional". I hope you choose growth. I wish you much success, and patience, as we strive to embrace change this year.

group that needs the information, that may require the help of someone from that department to do a Secure File Transfer.

## **Potluck Party Recipe**

#### **Lemonade Bars**

#### **Graham Cracker Crust**

1 Sleeve of Graham Crackers (about 8 crackers, crumbled)

1/4 Cup Brown Sugar

1/2 Cup Unsalted butter, melted

1/2 tsp Salt

#### **Lemon Custard**

3 Egg Yolks (Room Temperature)

1/2 Cup Lemon Juice Freshly Squeezed (About 4 Lemons)

1 Can Sweetened Condensed Milk 14 oz

1 Tbsp Lemon Zest (About One Lemon)

#### **Whipped Cream**

1 Cup Heavy Whipped Cream

3 Tbsp Powder Sugar

1 tsp Vanilla Extract

#### Extra

Zest of one lemon for topping

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line an  $8\times8$  or  $9\times9$  with parchment paper. Spray with non-stick cooking spray. Add graham crackers to a food processor or zip lock bag and turn into coarse crumbs. Add all the ingredients for the graham cracker crust into a bowl and mix. Dump crust into prepared baking dish. Take the bottom of a glass or measuring cup and press the crust into the pan. Press crust up the side of the pan 1 inch.

#### **Key Lime Pie Custard**

Add egg yolks to a medium bowl and whisk. Add in the rest of the custard ingredients and whisk together. Pour onto crust. Bake for 10-12 minutes. The custard will still have a little wiggle to it. Once out of the oven, let the bars completely cool. Cover with plastic wrap and let it chill in the refrigerator for at least two hours. Chill overnight for the best results. After pie has chilled, remove from parchment paper. Cut into bars. Top with whipped cream and some fresh lemon zest.

#### **Whipped Topping**

With the whisk attachment, add heavy whipping cream, powdered sugar, and vanilla extract to a bowl.

Whip on high till you get soft peaks. About 3-5 minutes. Enjoy!


Helpful tips on booking and getting ready for Field Trips.

**Bus Capacity:** 

High School/Adults = 56 max (2 per seat)

Junior High (including adults) = 70 max (half bus 2 to a seat and other half 3 to a seat)

Elementary (including adults) = 84 max (everyone is 3 to a seat)



Remember when you are putting in field trips that the start time is when the trip is to leave the school. End time is when the bus should be back to your school and unloading all students, Not the time you want to leave from your field trip location. Please keep in mind that 99% of all our drivers have routes that take them from a High School to Junior High to multiple Elementary schools. Please remember that buses only load and unload in designated bus zones.

There is a layout that will give you the ability to see the name, phone number of the driver and bus number. This is in the "Detail View", if you are not able to see this, please reach out to our Field Trip Coordinator Jeff G. at 7152. If anyone has any questions/concerns/problems with any field trip please reach out and let Jeff know. We are always happy to help.
