Certification Programs

What is GCPS? (Granite School District)

Granite Certified Professional Standards program (GCPS) is a program to encourage professional growth through education. In -service/education credit hours obtained can be turned in with an application process to acquire a professional certificate through (GCPS). Depending on the number of hours, a stipend amount can be paid each year (to be divided over 24 paychecks). Hourly secretaries can qualify for a one-time stipend (the dollar amount will be prorated based on the number of hours worked) and will be paid in June/July. GCPS application

What is PSP? (National)

The Professional Standards Program (PSP) is a voluntary program established by the National Association of Educational Office Professionals (NAEOP) to encourage educational office professionals to grow professionally. You must be an active or retired NAEOP member to qualify. The program is designed as a series of five levels in Option I and nine levels in Option II. Put all the ingredients into the blender. Liquids first, then ice. Place the lid on. Then process all ingredients together until frothy.


Pour into glasses. Serve with an orange slice.

GAEOP Meet & Confer 2020-21

GAEOP has completed our Meet and Confer with Administration and it has been approved by the Board of Education. Salary schedules have been updated by Human Resources. We are appreciative of the support we receive from the Board of Education and Administration.

- 1. Fund 5% Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) adjusted to the base of the secretary salary schedule (effective July 1, 2020).
- 2. A one-time bonus of 4%.
- Bonus money will be paid on November 30, 2020.
- Employee must be hired by November 1, 2020, to qualify for the bonus.
- Employee must be employed through November 30, 2020, to qualify for the bonus.
- Bonus money will be calculated on base salary only.
- 3. Fund incremental steps and lanes for the 2020-2021 contract year.
- 4. Continue to fund insurance programs offered to contract employees with no increase.
- 5. Continue training fund of \$20,000 with \$5,000 carryover, not to exceed \$25,000.

Distance Learning Tips & Tricks: Secretary Edition

I have seen many articles and social media posts on distance learning tips and tricks for students and teachers, but I have yet to see anything that focuses on the support staff or secretaries that have so diligently remained at the forefront of distance learning to ensure that all families and staff are as successful as possible. I have researched some suggested tips & tricks and came up with the following MUSTS to survive distance learning as support staff.

Mindset

Don't panic. Take a moment to recognize that although putting a system in place for distance learning may seem daunting, or less effective than what you are used to as a brick-and-mortar school, this is temporary. Try to let any defenses you might have go and enter into the mindset that this is a way of meeting your students' and families' needs during this unprecedented time. Distance learning is different and takes time to master well for all parties involved. Try to approach this with the spirit of a learner and adventurer, and be open to doing things differently. Also have patience with your teachers, parents, students, and yourself. Each of us is being challenged and learning new things in one capacity or another.

Take time to reboot. Venturing into the unknown is intimidating and mentally exhausting. When you are feeling overwhelmed in the moment, take a step back to calm yourself. Whether this is a quick walk around the school or even taking a minute to read or listen to some inspirational music. Take care of you.

Be a source of information

In addition to handling questions from teachers related to taking lessons online and troubleshooting tech issues, it is important school leaders also take on the role of chief information officer for the school community. Utilize your social media accounts, website, and PTA to post the most up-to-date information you have. Assess this information daily. We all know how quickly things have changed during this unprecedented time and ensuring that our families have accurate information will help lessen the burden of answering questions. Be sure instructions and expectations are clearly stated and in line with district policies. This will eliminate the need to send out corrected information to items previously sent out to the community.

Nuts and Bolts

Familiarize yourself with your technology resources. It is likely you will become the support for staff, students, and parents. Take some time to get to know the Chromebook and the software that students and staff will be expected to use to complete distance learning requirements. Organize your space. It is likely you will have added responsibilities you have never had on your plate before. For instance, logging Chromebook check-out information and damages, as well as making and distributing packets to those that need them. Or even calling parents and students struggling to see how you can support their needs. Use your space and resources to effectively organize this information as well as have it readily available to anyone who might need to see it. Have a plan. Anytime there is a new challenge to tackle (like distributing hundreds of Chromebooks to families within a day or two notice), create a well organized plan. Rally your troops to execute this plan and be sure they, too, understand the expectations. Once the plan is ready, share the information with those who need it.

Be a Source of Support

For the Staff. Be willing to go the extra mile to ensure the staff and teachers are able to work most effectively for their students. Keep in mind our end goal is to provide an education to our students in the best way possible.

For the Students. Be willing to make those phone calls or even Google Meets to those kids who need the extra help and emotional support. Letting them know you are still there, though in a different capacity, will do wonders for their ability to believe they can be successful in this environment as well.

For the Community. Every family is different and in turn, their needs are different. While one parent might just need a place to vent, another parent might need daily reassurance they are doing the best they can. We have students from all different backgrounds and situations. Be willing to support our families in whatever capacity they might need.
