

Potluck Party Recipes

Everyone loves a good potluck in the office. We are going to be featuring recipes this year that are easy to transport and use for those wonderful work related events. If you have a tried and true recipe please go to the recipe link and share your favorite.

Creamy Italian Potato & Zucchini Soup

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 yellow onion, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced or grated
- 3 medium zucchini, grated using a box grater
- 1 large potato, cut into medium-sized chunks
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 1 tablespoon freshly grated parmesan
- salt and pepper for seasoning
- 1 tablespoon butter (optional)

Add olive oil to a large pot and sauté the onion until soft and translucent. Add the garlic and sauté for 1 minute longer.

Add the grated zucchini and sauté for 1-2 minutes. Add the potatoes and chicken stock and bring to boil. Once boiling, turn down to a simmer and simmer for 20 minutes. Turn off the heat and using a handheld blender (immersion blender) blend the soup until smooth and creamy.

Stir in the grated parmesan and butter if using and season with salt and pepper.

Personalization:

It's my go-to for functions because it is gluten-free, and most kids don't realize it has veggies in it! My son loves this recipe.

I like to cook and prepare it the night before. The next day, I bring it in a crockpot and get it nice and warm before adding the parmesan and butter.

Free & Reduced Lunch

As a school district providing school meals, our commitment is to ensure students have access to nutritious food at all Granite sites. As we transition to a new school year, there are some important changes you need to know:

- Nationwide school meal COVID waivers from the USDA expired at the end of the 2021-2022 school year. This means Granite School District can no longer offer free breakfast and lunch to all students.
- Families must apply for free or reduced-price meals beginning the 2022-2023 school year.


 Follow this link to apply online for free or reduced-price meals. You may also turn in an application to Granite Nutrition Services at 4161 W. 2200 South, Salt Lake City, UT 84104.
- Students who qualify for reduced-price meals will continue to receive meals at no charge (this was a Granite School District decision).
- The following schools operate under the Community Eligibility Provision and will continue serving breakfast and lunch to all students at no cost: Lincoln Elementary, Moss Elementary, Redwood Elementary, Olene Walker Elementary, Wilson Elementary, and Granite Park Junior High.
- Schools currently operating a Breakfast in the Classroom (BIC) model will continue receiving breakfast at no cost. Traditional models will be charged as free, reduced or paid.

Who can receive Free or Reduced-Price School Meals?

Children may receive free or reduced-price meals if your household's income is within the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Children may qualify for free or reduced-price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits of the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.


- All children in households receiving benefits from Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) are eligible for free meals.
- Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
- Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.



The deserving recipient will receive a congratulatory visit, a \$25.00 Amazon gift card and a certificate. Other nominees will be recognized in our Kudos Corner of the monthly newsletter. At the end of the year, the

monthly winning nominations are reviewed by a different committee to select an overall GEM
